

Carleton Canoes Duplicate Indian Models



THE use of canvas covered canoes has spread so widely in the last few years as to place one or more and sometimes scores of them on every stream, river, pond, lake, and ocean bay. This popularity is not hard to understand when one considers that the advantages of this kind of water craft, both for pleasure and for work, have been tried out through centuries of use by the native American Indians. Beginning with the hollow log type, they at last evolved the birch bark canoe, in its day so dependable and so practical as to be the only water conveyance for its builders. This needed, to make it generally usable and available, only the advent of the inventive white man with his improved materials, methods of construction, and his ability to manufacture in large quantities.

The adaptability of canoes for use on any and every kind of water-way is attested to alike by pleasure-seekers, sportsmen, explorers, hunters, prospectors, vacationists, etc., who make up the great army of folks-out-of-doors. This twentieth century is permeated with a desire on the part of old and young to get into the "open" and "back to nature." A canoe is the practical embodiment of this spirit and because of low cost comes nearer than anything else to providing everybody with a means of enjoying the great out-of-doors. The first cost is practically the only cost, while in the case of motor-boats, automobiles, and other vehicles of

outdoor pleasures there is, after purchase, a steadily increasing cost of maintenance. The comparison in favor of canoes may be carried still further, for the model we build today is the same as last year's, the same as ten years ago, the same as the Indians themselves used, while with

motor-boats, autos, etc., the model of a year or two ago is an antique and ready for the scrap heap. Our models were produced by the Indians. They did the experimenting and left us the product of their centuries of trial. They were masters in designing models, and their aim was for speed, steadiness and carrying capacity. We can build a model of more steadiness at the sacrifice of speed, or of more speed at the sacrifice of carrying capacity, but for producing a combination of all these essential features we have to acknowledge the Red Man's excellence.

The Carleton Model Canvas Covered Canoe is a reproduction from a birch bark canoe belonging to the Penobscot or Tarratine tribe of Indians. It has been on the market for more than thirty-five years, being the pioneer in the modern canvas canoe. During all this period the continuing commendation of canoe users in general, including professional guides and Indians themselves, has kept us firm in the belief that our model in every detail is perfection and it has remained unchanged.

The only features in which it seemed that improvement was desirable lay in methods of manufacture, in high-class uniform workmanship and in the selection of tested and approved materials. Experience and continuous experiments have evolved methods in construction and in finish, as well as choice of superior materials, which assure, for Carleton Canoes, dependability in all particulars, for all sorts of uses, in all kinds of waterways.

Boats for Outboard Motors

UR facilities for building these dependable Carleton Canoes, together with our methods of construction and materials, logically made us ready-handed to build suitable boats for use with the new powerful outboard motors. More than eighteen years ago, when outboard motors were first coming into use, we built the Square Stern Canoe for them, and as improved and speedier motors have been developed, so we have kept apace with up-to-date boat models. Now we offer you a wide choice, from light, fast, easily portable models to large speedy family boats. (Pages 8 to 15.)

Canvas covered construction is naturally a practical one for these boats, assuring strength, lightness and water tightness. Some users prefer all-wood construction believing it to be better suited to some conditions of use. Our assortment of models includes both types of construction, canvas covered and all-wood, so that as a buyer you have for choice not only a varied list of models but also either one of the two outstanding

methods of present day construction.

Remember, Carleton Canoes and Boats have been manufactured continuously for more than thirty-eight years. They have always given uniform satisfaction. Look for the name CARLETON.



Description of Materials and Construction

AFTER the foregoing assurance of the correctness of our model, the next thing for you to examine is the kind and quality of the materials we use in Carleton Canoes.

First of all come the ribs and planking. These are of selected cedar free from destructive and unsightly knots, unsound or shaky imperfections. The ribs are of native State of Maine cedar, chosen for lightness, strength, elasticity in bending, and for its natural tendency to hold accurately and permanently the shape into which ribs made of it are molded by steaming and bending over a solid form. The planking is in long lengths and is fastened to the ribs securely with brass tacks, solidly clinched. Gunwales are selected, straight grained spruce, built in open type only, as this style is so much more practical and stronger than the closed style. Stems are shaped from white ash. Seat frames, thwarts, and decks from ash, birch, and maple. Bow seats are dropped on 4 inch bolts. Bow and stern seats of cane, detachable, and two thwarts, detachable, furnished with each canoe. Third thwart, in center, removable, in seventeen and eighteen-foot canoes. Copper, brass, and galvanized iron fastenings throughout. Canvas No. 8 seamless, close woven on canoes; No. 6 on outboard motor boats and dinghy. Brass bang plates. Hardwood keel 78" deep runs entire length of the bottom of all Carleton Canoes. Canoes with mahogany trimmings are supplied under the name of Indian Princess (see pages 5 and following).

Special paint of our own formula is employed in filling the canvas, and by its use the pores of the canvas are thoroughly filled and a smooth surface built up, obliterating entirely the texture of the canvas, and enabling us with the use of the highest grade of Japan color and Spar Varnish to produce a smooth, glossy, almost glassy surface. This finish wears marvelously well under the most exacting service and can, when entirely worn off, be restored by using our refinishing materials. Stock colors of canoes, Dark Green (always in stock), Dark Red, Light Green, Light Red. Any color will be furnished in eight days' time if we are provided with sample of shade, usually at no extra cost, except White, for price of which see page 19.



Carleton Sponson Canoe



ROR those who desire a "double assurance" of safety in canoes, we suggest our Sponson model, a craft which it is practically impossible to upset, and which, even though filled with water, will aid in supporting the weight of three or more people. The sponsons are long, hollow air chambers of wood construction covered with canvas. They are built onto the sides of our Carleton Canoe (page 4) and Carleton Indian Princess Canoe (page 5) just below the gunwale and extending from bow to stern. They are not bulky or conspicuous, and in following the lines of the canoe do not detract from its gracefulness. The spon-



sons do not touch the water unless the canoe is canted; so they do not retard the craft's progress. Rowlocks may be added and the canoe used as a rowboat if desired. These Sponson canoes enjoy wide popularity, and their use under all conditions has proved them thoroughly dependable and safe. Price includes keel and

Carleton Dinghy Open Gunwales



EVERYONE likes this dinghy. It is water tight no matter how long you leave it on shore or on deck. The canvas cover takes care of this. The same construction as in our canoes but heavier (No. 6) canvas. It tows easily and stows snugly on deck. Is a standard equipment with many naval architects.

Above illustration shows the 9 ft. length. It is fitted with 1" cotton rope bumper in groove around the gunwales, for which there is an extra charge of \$7.00. A similar rope on the 7½ ft. dinghy costs \$7.00 and on the 11½ ft. dinghy \$9.00. Price below includes 2 pairs polished brass rowlocks (1 pair with 7½ ft.), bilge keels, davit rings and towing ring. Trimmings (seats, gunwales and stern board) are spruce and oak in regular grade and mahogany in Indian Princess grade. Oars priced page 20. Canvas regularly finished Dark Green. Other colors delay shipment ten days (see page 3). White costs \$5.00 extra.

Carleton Lapstreak Cedar Boat



O take care of the demand for a high-grade all wood rowboat we have designed the above model. This picture evidences the sturdy construction and gives you some idea of the handsome appearance of the boat. It is finished in natural wood with varnish. No finer boat could be desired. As a rowboat it operates very easily, offering a minimum resistance in going through the water due to its refined lines. Seating space is roomy and comfortable. Small motor may be used but a rowing model will not perform as efficiently with motor as a boat designed especially for motor like our Square Stern Boat (pages 10 and 11).

Planking is ½" thick cedar, brass fastened, to elm or oak ribs. Edges of planks are also brass fastened to each other. Keel and stem oak. Transom oak. Gunwales mahogany. Seats spruce or cedar. Galvanized rowlocks. Hitching eye at stem. Equipped with floor rack. Width of transom 29½ in.

Carleton Square Stern Boat

N outboard motor can be used with the utmost efficiency and enjoyment only when attached to a boat especially designed for the purpose. Expertness of design and highgrade materials are what make this boat so well suited to all-round uses with motors ranging from 21/2 h.p. to 10 h.p. The bow is sharp with shapely flare to throw off the water at high speed. There is a marked V-shape just back of the bow and this gradually flattens to a perfectly flat floor at the stern, where ample width (39") assures bearing for the motor and travel on a level keel. It has unusual stability and seaworthiness combined with handsome appearance and capaciousness. It is popular everywhere and adaptable alike to lakes, rivers, streams, and ocean. Can be used as a rowboat. Usually equipped with sponsons (described on page 7). Supplied with polished brass rowlocks, hitching eye, floor rack and tool box under stern seat. Oars are extra and priced on page 20. Heavy No. 6 canvas is used. Long deck (48") costs \$18.00 extra and the boat then must be crated (costing \$5.00) for shipment. Waterproof khaki canvas cover costs \$15,00.

14 ft. and 12 ft. Carleton Square Stern Boat



SOME users find desirable a boat shorter than 16 ft., which, however, is generally the best length for all-round purposes especially from the standpoint of capacity. In recognition of this definite demand for shorter boats usable with outboard motors or oars we have added a 14 ft. and a 12 ft. Square Stern to our line. The 14 ft. length is stocked both with and without sponsons. Illustrations show model without sponsons and having natural knees bracing gunwales to seat. With sponsons these knees are not necessary and plan of construction is shown in the 16 ft. boat page 10.




These lengths are seaworthy, staunch, dry boats, capable of carrying any of the standard motors of reasonable size and recommended for use with 3 h.p. to 12 h.p. Speeds of 6 miles to 15 miles. Owners have reported speeds of over thirty miles for the 14 ft. boat carrying a 32 h.p. motor. Smaller motors usually meet the requirements for all-round pleasure and sporting uses.

Equipment includes polished brass rowlocks, hitching eye, floor rack and tool box under the stern seat. Oars are extra and priced on page 20. Long deck (48") costs \$18.00 and boat then requires crating for shipment (costing \$5.00). Waterproof khaki cover costs \$13.50 for the 14' boat and \$12.00 for the 12' boat.

Carleton All-Wood Sea King





HERE is outstanding value in a boat for use with any of the popular outboard motors. It is handsome, fast, sturdy and seaworthy, with ample and comfortable seating capacity. Its lines assure maximum speed depending on the load and size of motor. Recommended with motors of 4 h.p. to 24 h.p. with which speeds of from 8 to 25 miles have been realized. Suggest 4 h.p. to 16 h.p. for 14 ft. boat, 10 h.p. to 24 h.p. for 16 ft. boat, and 16 h.p. to 32 h.p. for 18 ft. boat.

The construction throughout is of the highest order. Our aim is to provide a general purpose motor boat to meet the severest kind of

service and yet be fast, be handsome and be seaworthy.

Planking is cedar 1/16" thick, smooth laid in narrow strips, and brass screwed to oak or ash ribs. Philippine wood, finished mahogany, is used for decking, stern board, seat backs and tool box cover. Cedar hull is finished light gray outside and all other woodwork

is varnished natural color. Cedar hull can be finished any other standard color without extra charge. Price includes hitching eye. Seat cushions, kapoc-filled, covered with artificial leather, cost \$8.00 for each cross seat. Set of two costs \$16.00 and one cushion for tool box seat costs \$4.00. Steering wheel, marine type, costs \$14.00, auto type with remote control \$25.00. Waterproof canvas cover costs \$16.00 for 14 ft., \$18.00 for 16 ft., \$22.00 for 18 ft. Polished brass rowlocks, \$3.00.



NE of our most popular models is here illustrated in de Luxe equipment. There is a cross center decking which costs \$18.00 and incidentally can be built into the 14 ft. and 16 ft. lengths as well as the 18 ft. Boat. The auto type steerer with remote control costs \$25.00 installed. It can be located as shown in the picture or in front seat as you prefer. The bow chocks and mooring bit in polished brass cost \$4.00. Two cleats at stern \$2.00. Bow and stern lights installed cost \$18.00 not including battery (five dry cells required). Two cross seat cushions \$16.00. Two cushions for tool box seat \$8.00. Polished brass rowlocks \$3.00. Adding these items to price of boat on preceding page and total cost for 18 ft. All Wood Sea King with De Luxe Equipment is \$294.00. Price of waterproof cover with motor hood is \$25.00. A windshield for the 18 ft., 16 ft. or 14 ft. Sea King costs \$22.00.

Waterproof Canvas Cover



In the above illustration our high-grade waterproof khaki cover is shown on a 16 ft. Carleton All-Wood Sea King. When mooring bit and chocks are on boat there are hinged covers to go over them as pictured. This same type of cover is used on all our Sea Kings and the following prices apply, for 14 ft. boat, \$16.00; for 16 ft. boat, \$18.00; for 18 ft. boat, \$22.00. If desired hood can be built into cover to go over motor at stern for extra charge of \$3.00. Khaki colored fabric used in making these covers is specially woven and waterproofed for the purpose. A cotton draw rope runs around the edge of cover so as to make it tight to sides of boat. Lift-the-Dot fasteners are spaced along the sides and at the stern end. Very high-grade covers, durable and efficient.




Carleton Canvas Covered Rowboat

O water craft using canvas for a covering has more positively demonstrated the sturdiness and wearing qualities of this type of construction than this rowboat. We have been building canvas covered rowboats for more than thirty years and it is not unusual to hear from owners who bought them during the first years of our business that the boats are still in active service. There are lakes in Maine where no other kind of fishing boat can be seen. This model is unusually seaworthy, easy to row, comfortable to occupy as a rower or passenger and always water tight. Immediately when you put the boat into the water it is usable and dry without need of joints swelling as with the ordinary wood boat. Moreover, the price is extremely reasonable, for in no other type of construction is it possible to get so handsome and so easy handling a boat for anywhere near as low price.

The canvas (No. 6) is heavier than on our regular canoes. The open gunwales are larger dimensioned to assure the utmost rigidity for towing. There is a protecting keel and also outside stems. Price includes two pairs rowlocks (galvanized in regular grade and polished brass in Indian Princess grade), 4 seats, 2 back rests as illustrated and a painter ring. Stock color Dark Green. 

Carleton War Canoe Open Gunwales

ARLETON WAR CANOES provide a way to journey in groups after the Indian fashion of centuries ago. They offer a means of racing in groups when the rhythmic dip of ten to twenty paddles in perfect stroking develops a unity of mind and muscle that makes for the highest type of team work.

Boys' and girls' summer camps are finding these canoes the very backbone of their water sports programs and they keep them in daily use for jaunts and racing and group traveling. The 25 ft. canoe carries 6 to 12 paddlers and the 34 ft. canoe carries

12 to 21 paddlers.

The canoes are built with a very rigid and strongly braced frame. Thwarts are 4" wide, spaced 27" apart. Each canoe has a removable floor rack, heavy spruce open gunwales and 30" long decks.

Because they are too long to go through the regular side door of an ordinary 36 ft. box car, the railroads must furnish special wide side door or end door cars and so charge for at least 1000 lbs. weight, even though the canoe or canoes weigh less. It therefore pays when shipping one or more war canoes to have the shipment contain enough canoes (war or regular) so that the combined shipping weight equals 1000 lbs. at least. The regular canoe rate applies.

Decorating - Repairing - Refinishing

ANOE owners are more and more demanding that their canoes be made individual and distinctive by means of decorative designs and special colors used separately or in combination. In addition to the usual stock colors we can supply single special colors to sample of customer and usually there is no extra charge. White costs extra as

shown below. Striping can be done in gold or in colors. Generally gold stripes $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide or color stripes $1\frac{1}{2}$ " to 2" wide are specified. Color stripes 3" to 4" are frequently placed next to the gunwales with the ends of stripes turned down around the stems or ends of the canoe — this manner of stripe is sometimes called a border stripe. Work of this kind requires extra time and ten days or longer should be allowed.
